

Tessa Munt MP's Update



Parliament was pretty lively last month! Thank you if you've written or spoken to me to share your views, concerns and to ask questions. I take the issues you raise here up to Westminster and press the Government to make changes wherever they're needed.

I'm honoured to have been elected as Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group on ME. Since becoming your MP, I've pressed the Government to reverse decades of neglect of this condition. I'll work with colleagues across the political spectrum so ME receives the long overdue investment into research it needs.

The Government has U-turned on business rates for pubs and other hospitality venues. Whilst I'm pleased with a partial reversal of this disastrous Budget announcement, it's clear that more is needed to support the wider tourist industry, so my colleagues and I will continue to raise this.

Having received messages from local childminders, I pressed Ministers to reinstate the 10% wear-and-tear tax allowance for these workers, as their homes are put through

their paces with children's potty training, learning to eat with a knife and fork, and drinking from an open cup. It's important that this allowance is reinstated or an alternative is put in place for those who offer home-based childcare.

Over the past year, several local residents have contacted me about the uncertain future of the 'Listed Places of Worship Grant Scheme', which allows our listed churches and chapels to apply for a grant to cover VAT on building works. I've questioned Ministers in Parliament several times and was informed that there will in the future be a 'Places of Worship Renewal Fund' once the current scheme comes to an end this month. I have concerns about the new eligibility criteria for this fund and will watch closely as information is made available. Please let me know if you have any questions.

I've continued my work on the Public Office (Accountability) Bill (known as the 'Hillsborough Law'). Yet again, the Government has rejected Amendment 23, which would require a High Court Judge to decide - in closed session - what safeguards should be in place and how much security and intelligence information can be passed on to an Inquiry, Inquest, Investigation or Independent Panel. This happens now, so it's not difficult. The Hillsborough families, amongst others, have been fighting for this for 35 years. Experience tells them the law must insist everyone in public office tells the truth. No ifs, no buts.

As ever, if you would like to speak to me about anything concerning you, please don't hesitate to email or phone my office. I'll be running my regular 'surgeries' throughout 2026, for March, the most local surgeries will be on Saturday 7 March from 08.30am to 10.00am at Coffee #1, Wells; Friday 13 March from 08.00am to 09.00am at Edelweiss Café, Cheddar; and Saturday 14 March from 09.00am to 10.00am at The Bluebird Café, Wedmore. All surgeries operate on a first come, first served basis and no appointment is necessary. If you can't come to see me, I'll come to see you.

The article I write each month exists to explain, in plain English, what the Parish Council has been doing, what decisions have been taken, and where work is still ongoing. It is written after meetings, and it is based entirely on published agendas, approved minutes and formally recorded resolutions.

It is not where decisions are made; it is not a substitute for minutes; and it is not a way of quietly changing outcomes or announcing policy.

The Parish Council's formal and authoritative position on any matter is set out in its agendas and approved minutes. That is the public record. If it isn't there, it isn't a Council decision.

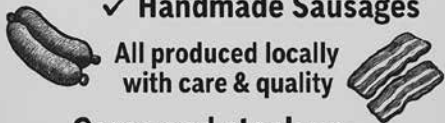

When this column refers to past decisions, it does so because those decisions are already public, already minuted, and already available to anyone who wishes to read them. The purpose of the column is explanation and context for residents who do not routinely read council papers (which is most people!), not advocacy, not opinion, and not a version of events. Explaining how a decision was reached is not the same as pushing for an outcome. Being clear about it does not make it informal or unofficial.

Most residents raise questions openly, engage constructively and accept that local government comes with constraints as well as choices. A small number, however, prefer side conversations, selective quotation, or quiet suggestion that something unofficial or improper is going on. That approach does not improve transparency; it tends to create confusion instead.

I take my role as Clerk seriously. My job is to make sure decisions are lawful, properly recorded and clearly reported. Writing this column is part of that job. It exists to make local government easier to understand, not to provide material for speculation about process or motive.

If anyone wants to challenge a decision, the right place to do that is through the published record. If anyone wants to understand how something was decided, the agendas and minutes are there to be read. Side commentary about the process doesn't help anyone.

Since the last article, the Parish Council has met as a Highways Committee, a Planning Committee and as Full Council. The Highways Committee considered a range of ongoing issues, including traffic management, drainage, road condition and safety concerns. Residents attended to raise issues and share views, which were noted in line with the Committee's procedures. Engagement with Somerset Council continues on matters where responsibility sits elsewhere.

The Planning Committee considered several applications across the parish, providing policy-based comments and supporting appropriate development. This included support for the proposed conversion of the former Methodist church into a dental practice, recognising both the benefit of improved local healthcare provision and the sensible reuse of an important building. Members also received an update on the forthcoming Cavanna Homes public consultation and noted ongoing enforcement matters being handled by Somerset Council.

The Full Council meeting focused on finance, governance and oversight. Councillors adopted updated governance documents to strengthen internal controls and took decisions on several practical matters relating to community assets and facilities. Updates were also received from committees covering events, environmental work, community resilience and routine asset management.

Wedmore works best when issues are raised openly, discussed respectfully and grounded in fact. Maintaining private responsibilities such as ditches and boundary hedges, reporting issues through proper channels and engaging constructively with consultations all make a real difference.

Thank you to the many residents who engage in good faith with councillors and officers. That approach, open, informed and direct, is the one that genuinely helps the parish move forward.

Community SpeedWatch – Helping Keep Our Parish Roads Safe

Speeding remains one of the most frequent concerns raised with the Parish Council, particularly on routes where pedestrians, schoolchildren, and cyclists are most vulnerable. In response, we are pleased to support the launch of a Community SpeedWatch (CSW) group within the parish, a volunteer-led initiative designed to encourage safer driving and raise awareness.

CSW is a partnership between local residents and the police. Trained volunteers use approved equipment to record the speeds of passing vehicles at locations where speeding has been reported. Drivers who exceed the limit receive advisory letters from the police, reminding them to slow down. The focus is education, not enforcement. The simple presence of volunteers in high-visibility clothing often encourages drivers to reduce their speed.

After receiving repeated concerns from residents, the Parish Council are currently investigating whether there would be enough volunteers to create a meaningful speed watch in the Parish. Subject to sufficient volunteers the Parish Council will arrange with the Avon and Somerset Police's Community SpeedWatch coordinator to identify suitable monitoring points and arranged training for volunteers. Each session involves at least three trained residents who work together to monitor speeds, record details, and ensure everyone's safety. All information collected is passed directly to the police for follow-up. The Parish Council will share anonymised results from CSW sessions in future newsletters and at parish meetings. This helps us track trends, highlight problem areas, and support discussions with highways authorities about longer-term improvements.

We are grateful to the residents who have already stepped forward to take part. Their time and commitment make a real difference to the safety and wellbeing of our community. King Alfred Project Group Update

Save Wedmore Lives 20mph Limit

Many people are asking how the campaign for a 20mph limit is progressing, so we have updated our website with new information. This includes a map of Wedmore, issued by Somerset Highways, showing the boundary of a proposed new 20mph limit. Now all residents can find out at a glance if they will live within the new limit area.

The website also includes a statement from Somerset Highways confirming that 'Wedmore is suitable for a 20mph speed limit'; a list of 25 other Somerset villages for whom Somerset Highways have recently authorised a 20mph speed limit, and how they achieved it; and the Department for Transport guidance on reducing speed limits in villages and on rural roads to improve safety and reduce fear in local communities, as well as improving the environment.

We have also updated much of our other relevant information on this issue, including the past and forthcoming Parish Surveys, and UK Government research data on the link between speeding vehicles and road traffic accidents, particularly on rural roads.

And a big thank you to the overwhelming numbers of Wedmore residents who have already signed up as supporters and helpers on the website. 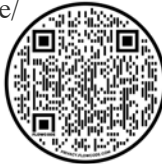

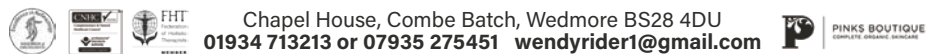

Wedmore Community Bus Needs New Drivers

Due to the design of our new Community Bus, it can now be driven by anyone with a standard driving licence. New drivers will now merely need to complete a simple assessment and DBS check, and they will be ready to start giving a valuable service to our community. The new bus is also much easier to drive than our old one.

This is great news for the Community Bus as we need more volunteer drivers to resource our expanding services. Drivers are needed for scheduled services on Mondays to Fridays and/or some Saturdays and/or Private Hire for local community and social groups on weekday afternoons/evenings and at weekends. We would particularly welcome volunteers connected with community groups as we'd like to expand use of the bus for private hire by this sector.

Driving the bus isn't a big commitment. Many volunteers are only available occasionally, but they still make a valuable contribution. Even the volunteers who drive most frequently rarely drive more than once a month and they only drive at times when they make themselves available. Also, even when a driver has been timetabled for a trip there is flexibility to swap if she/he becomes unavailable.

Driving is very rewarding as it provides an important service to many local residents and community groups. It is fun as the bus is a friendly place where there is normally a happy buzz of conversation and plenty of laughs. It isn't difficult. All drivers are given free training by an approved Somerset Council trainer.

New self-referral system speeds up breast cancer diagnosis in Somerset

A new self-referral pathway for people with symptoms of breast cancer is giving patients in Somerset faster access to specialist care, while reducing pressure on GP services. Since its launch a year ago, 866 people have self-referred directly to Somerset NHS Foundation Trust's breast diagnostic clinic, without the need for a GP

appointment. Of those, 48 have been diagnosed with cancer, with 34 progressing onto treatment, and 727 being identified as non-cancerous, demonstrating the strength of the clinically led digital triage in directing higher-risk patients into urgent specialist care, and reassuring those at lower risk.

Somerset NHS Foundation Trust was the first in England to introduce this pathway, which is accessed via NHS 111 online, a national digital triage product designed to help people reach the right level of care for their symptoms, and the NHS App. It allows eligible patients with worrying symptoms, such as a breast lump, to be referred straight to a breast diagnostic clinic, speeding up cancer diagnosis and freeing up valuable GP appointments.

Rosie Edgerley, cancer programme manager at Somerset NHS Foundation Trust, said: 'The introduction of the self-referral system is a significant step forward in supporting people with breast symptoms. By enabling patients to bypass their GP and be referred directly for specialist assessment, we are helping them to be seen more quickly during what can be an anxious and worrying time. This new pathway means patients get the reassurance or treatment they need sooner, while also easing pressure on our GP colleagues.'

One in seven women in the UK develop breast cancer during their lifetime, and it's more common in older women.

Tasty Morsels – Lemon Cheesy Pasta Bake

Ingredients –

1 small head of broccoli (about 200g) cut into pieces
275g uncooked cavatappi (spiral) pasta
500ml vegetable stock
50g parmesan cheese - grated
1 large unwaxed lemon
2 large garlic cloves -minced
280g cream cheese (a family size tub)
Pinch of salt and pepper
50g mild cheddar – grated (optional)

Method –

Preheat the oven to 190C. Add broccoli, pasta, stock, parmesan cheese and garlic to a large baking dish (13in by 9in minimum, you will need room to be able to stir). Zest the lemon and add to the dish (reserve the lemon for its juice later). Stir until evenly combined and pasta is mostly submerged in the liquid. Nestle the cream cheese in the centre of the baking dish. Cover tightly with foil.

Bake for 40 minutes, remove from the oven. Juice half of the reserved lemon and add to the dish. Stir the ingredients together to incorporate the lemon juice. Cover with foil and bake for another 10 minutes.

Remove from the oven and serve, or sprinkle the cheddar cheese on the top, turn the oven to 220C and bake an addition 5 to 10 minutes until the cheese is golden brown.

You can substitute 500g skinless chicken thighs cut into strips, for the broccoli, to make this a heartier meal. The chicken will cook along with the pasta.

This Month in the Garden

I don't know how, but spring is definitely here! Warming sunshine, birdsong a-plenty, gardens a-growing, and everyone's a-smiling. Well, here's a-hoping!

Take the opportunity to lift that spreading clump of perennial border plant, use a spade to chop in half several times, discard the old centre and replant the fresh outer

pieces into compost enriched soil or fresh locations in the border. Pot up a few fresh clumps for the garden sales later in the year. If the border is lacking colour, add a few wallflowers or forget-me-nots from the local nursery. They may even have some *Primula denticulata* (drumstick primula) in white or lilac shades, glorious amongst primrose and polyanthus, as some of the early bulbs go out of flower.

That rotted compost can now be spread around the borders, so freeing up the compost bins for the new season, but if there are any perennial weeds in the borders, especially bindweed or bramble, dig these out before applying the mulch.

If you sowed some sweet peas last autumn, they can be planted out now but harden them off for a week or so outside before planting. Be weatherwise, especially at this time of year, and delay if there's a frosty spell of weather.

This is the last chance to prune the rose bushes. If you've been a bit 'gentle' previously, now would be a good time to prune several of the oldest branches hard down to near the base. This renewal-pruning may be hard on the wrist, with loppers or secateurs, but will really encourage the bush to grow more healthy fresh shoots. Prune the remaining shoots lightly, and this will help to spread the season of bloom.

On a rainy day, time to get seed sowing. Tomatoes of course (which is your favourite variety?) head the list, but wait a bit longer to sow cucumber, melons, marrows, courgettes, and squash. Beans can also wait, but lettuce, radish, peas, beetroot, salsify, and cabbage can all be sown outside now. Also a useful catch-up crop is spinach, a very healthy fast growing leafy plant, delicious with a sprinkle of salt and a helping of butter. Spinach can be sown outdoors now or, if the weather is cold and wet, can be sown in trays or modules for planting out later. A very worthwhile catch-up crop.

Salad onions can be sown outside, or in trays inside, for an early addition to the salad bowl. A perennial alternative would be to grow chives in a pot inside or outside. These are really useful and very decorative, even the attractive flowers are edible. Many years ago, I sold lots of these at the Bath and West Show when the flowers proved to be a real eyecatcher. This was from the nursery that, in a previous year, had sold many wooden benches, claiming that the lovely late Queen Elizabeth had rested on them during a visit to the showground. Actually, she only briefly sat on one bench, but we 'forgot' which one it was, so we sold quite a few!

This is a good time to take a note of any special daffodils, so that you can purchase the right bulbs next September. For small gardens and containers, I still prefer the smaller varieties and 'Jetfire' is an absolute must, along with handfuls of that little gem 'Tete-a-Tete'. Once flowering is finished, remember that this is the ideal time to carefully lift, divide, and replant established clumps of bulbs so you can locate them in exactly the right spot. Whilst out for a country walk, keep a look out for brown hares, maybe a pair boxing (courting behaviour) and, if that worked, the young jacks and jills will be born 40 odd days later. These beautiful creatures may be a grazing nuisance but, with speeds up to 45mph, they are part of our wonderful countryside and long may they survive, as long as it is not feasting on our allotments!

Here we are, folks, ‘bouncing’ into spring, or is it spring ‘bouncing’ into us? For me it is always a relief to know spring is coming very soon. It so often feels that I may not make it. That in a large part is my ‘Seasonal Affective Disorder’, so called. Those of you who experience this know exactly what it feels like: the short days, the cold and rain, and those heavily leaden clouds in the sky.



Four years ago Anne and I were hit with Covid so badly that it was nearly the end in for both of us. Gosh, it really was so bad. With so much sadness it truly was the physical end for Anne, already suffering with three cancers. With me being so ill I couldn’t do the healing work to either save her, or ease her journey, which I have done for folk through the years.

For me, I sank into the deep dark depths of ‘The Dark Night of the Soul’, where no one can reach you fully, and you can’t fully help yourself. Most people don’t go there, yet many do, many more than you might think. There I remained for three years. I was going to a grief group, and still do, that meets every Thursday 2.00pm to 4.00pm at the Comfort Cafe next to St John’s Church in Glastonbury. It helped. Then I participated in The Grief Recovery Method Course, this time last year. That was a seriously heavy number yet started me on that long road to recovery.

I met someone on the course whose daughter had reached the end of her days yet knew I could save her. I had the training and the knowledge and the upstairs support. I can’t talk of it beyond saying this. As a result it helped ‘me’ through. Helping others, helps oneself.

That is along with the vital need to move, keep moving. That came with walking and walking the country lanes, along with chi kung and tai chi, and meditation. For a long time during those three years I could do little more, such is the Dark Night of the Soul. Much more time in contemplation, or just ‘dead’ to the world.

I have touched on this before, so why again now? Well, Facebook sent me a memory photo of Anne and I, taken 16 years ago in the woods at Nut Tree Farm amongst the cow parsley. So, given Anne’s 4th year of passing is coming up shortly I thought to send it out again. I am astounded that there have been 150 ‘likes’ and responses, so far. Anne thought she had little impact, mostly in the background. When I told her of the responses she was amazed. Always modest, always love she spread around, with quiet cutting and silly, naughty, humour. I am ‘lucky’ that we still connect, is how I have to look at life. 50 years with Anne on the physical plane.

So, what can you do when confronted with someone in deepest grief? For the first six months some folk used to ask me around for a coffee and a chat. For me, the very last thing I wanted, though, for many, that is what they want. Then the invites stop, just when you feel you could do with that company. Of course, they think you are over it. That is for those who have yet to experience such grief. So watch for what people need, or you think they need. Be gentle with approaches, don’t be offended if rebuffed, and try again later on. Don’t be embarrassed if they cry, don’t be fooled by their laughter. At the grief group I attend and help, there is often much laughter and silliness, and there often are tears and deep thoughts. All is good.

Is Unsustainable Housing Development a Threat to Our Rural Community?

An Extraordinary Meeting of Wedmore Parish Council was held on 12 November 2025 to hear an early presentation from Cavanna Homes on potential housing development on land off Lascot Hill. Around 50 residents attended. The land under discussion comprises two fields behind the St Médard Estate, currently crossed by public rights of way. The proposal is understood to involve between 50 and 100 homes, with a single vehicular access point from the top of Lascot Hill. As mentioned in the News section of this issue, Cavanna Homes will be holding a public exhibition of the development proposals at Wedmore Village Hall on 5 March.

In response, a local action group, Save Our Diverse Open Fields Forever (SODOFF), has been formed. SODOFF has linked with communities across Somerset facing similar pressures, including Keinton Mandeville, where Stop Housing Obliterating the Character of Keinton (SHOCK) was established after Somerset Council approved plans for 100 homes in June 2025.

SHOCK has since launched a crowdfunding campaign to pursue a judicial review of that decision and is working with other communities under a new umbrella group, Somerset Communities Raging Against Poor Planning (SCRAPP). SCRAPP's

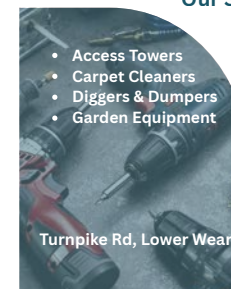

inaugural meeting on 23 January was attended by around 50 representatives from 24 villages across the county, including several members of SODOFF.

Campaigners say rural communities are increasingly expected to absorb large-scale development without adequate infrastructure, services, or meaningful consultation. The meeting unanimously agreed to formally establish SCRAPP, carried a motion for action to safeguard the interests of rural communities across Somerset, and concluded with a vote of 'No Confidence' in Somerset Council.

What happens next? Following the strong endorsement for collective action, the focus has now shifted to getting SCRAPP fully established. This includes finalising its constitution, refining its aims, and creating a website and social media presence. Once these foundations are in place, community groups, Parish Councils, and other interested parties across Somerset will be invited to join a coordinated and collaborative effort to protect the character and sustainability of rural communities.

Our Health and Wellbeing

In consultation with Axbridge and Wedmore Medical Practice and with the support of Wedmore Parish Council, here is this month's item relating to our health and wellbeing.

I Spy With My Little Eye Something Beginning With 'S' - Sunshine!

I hope it's not wishful thinking, as I write this in January, but I think I see a glimmer as we head towards Spring! So there's no better time than now to think about keeping our eyes as healthy as possible, so we can see the emerging green shoots and vibrant flowers of Spring. According to www.patient.info our eyes 'deserve a long-term plan'. There are some factors which can increase our risk of eye conditions which are beyond our control, e.g. genetics, ethnicity, and age, however there is much we can do to minimise the risk of eye diseases and preserve good vision.

Fortunately, many of these strategies are good for our hearts, brains, and minds too. Firstly good nutrition plays a significant role. A diet rich in carotenoids, antioxidants, Omega-3 fatty acids, and drinking plenty of water are just some of the specific actions we can take for healthy eyes. Non nutritional advice includes the 20-20-20 rule when it comes to using screens. It suggests that every 20 minutes, you should look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds before returning to your task. This will help to minimise eye strain and keep eyes well lubricated. Consultant Ophthalmologist, Mr Alex Day, advises that we should contact an optician or optometrist if we notice any changes in vision, e.g. blurriness, difficulty reading small print, redness, pain, dark spots or lines in your vision, or glare from lights at night. For many more tips and information go to www.patient.info and search for the article 'Future-proof your sight'.

The NHS reminds us that 'our eyes rarely hurt when something is wrong with them, so having regular eye tests is important to help detect potentially harmful conditions'. The NHS recommends that we should have our eyes tested every 2 years, or more

often if advised by your ophthalmic practitioner or optometrist. Eye tests are free for some people, e.g. children under 16 and up to 18 for those in full time education, people over 60, and people with certain conditions, such as diabetes or glaucoma. For more information visit the NHS website about Free NHS eye tests and vouchers. You can also use the Acute Community Eyecare Scheme (ACES), which is an easily accessible service for acute symptoms affecting the eyes. We can go straight to a participating optometrist or optician without a GP referral. This is free to anyone registered with a GP in Somerset and the optometrist can advise on many conditions, for example, sudden or recent reduction in vision in one or both eyes, red eye(s) or eye lids, pain or discomfort in the eyes, around the eye area or temples, recent onset or sudden increase of flashes or floaters in one or both eyes. To find out more go to the Somerset eye care website. Our nearest optometrists who will provide this service are in Cheddar, Wells and Burnham.

Having good eyesight is essential to be able to drive safely. In our rural area, driving is a real advantage in keeping up social contacts, going shopping, and maintaining independence. A change is being considered, and 'consulted on' by the Government, that people over 70 years of age should have an eye test every 3 years to confirm that their vision is good enough to drive, rather than a self-declaration of good eyesight. For full details and rationale for testing go to the www.gov.uk and search for consultations on tests for older drivers. Of course we know that eyesight often deteriorates in visual acuity or sharpness as we age. And whether we drive or not there is a good rationale for regular eye testing: 'eyesight tests not only help ensure drivers meet the vision standards but also play a vital role in helping to detect various other medical conditions and eye diseases at an early stage'. This means that early treatment can preserve sight for as long as possible and, therefore, contribute to safer driving.

As well as seeing well enough to drive, we need to be able to keep physically fit enough get in and out of a car! Perhaps you would like to do a simple test to give you some idea? The Sit-to-Stand test detailed at www.patient.info is used by professionals to assess strength, coordination, balance, posture, and biomechanics (how your body's built, how it functions, and how it moves). There are various versions of the test, but they are all essentially involve moving from a sitting to a standing position. You can do the test in the privacy of your own home and see for yourself how you do! As we move into springtime, now is the time to look after our eyes, ready to see the first glimmer of sunshine and get out in it!

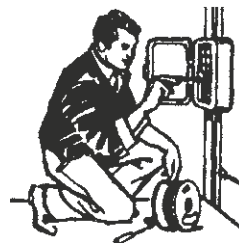

It's sufficiently well established that most people in the Isle of Wedmore community have some idea of what sort of neighbourly help our volunteers provide. However, if you'd like a bit more detail, here are some numbers for our latest annual report.

In 2025 our amazing volunteers did a total of 367 jobs, 146 home visits, and 221 driving jobs, of which 86% were for medical appointments. These figures are broadly in line with the last two years, suggesting that we have probably arrived at a steady state of around 400 jobs per year.

If you don't have a car, or it's not convenient to drive yourself, getting to the doctor's surgery or a hospital can be a challenge. Taxis are very expensive and rather impersonal. Provided it's not an emergency and you give us about a week's notice we can almost certainly find a willing volunteer to provide transport and company



as far as Taunton and Bristol. If there are any other local club meetings you'd like to attend, but you're not sure how to get there, then give us a call.

Our volunteers are now visiting a small number of people in their own homes for a regular cuppa and a chat. If you, or someone you know, would like this kind of neighbourly help just call us and leave a message.

There may be other situations where you could use a bit of neighbourly help. Maybe you are unwell and need your dog walking? Got a prescription you'd like collecting from the chemist? Have some items that need taking to the recycling centre? Give us a call and we'll see what we can do.

Wedmore Good Neighbours is operated by volunteers and is free to use. However, the group does have running costs – insurance, petrol expenses, as well as the DBS vetting and training of volunteers. So, if you do use the service, and want to make a donation, this is always very welcome, just talk to your volunteer about this. Demand for the group's services has been steadily increasing so if you'd like to become a volunteer, you'd be most welcome.

Whatever your request, or you would like to volunteer, please call us on 01934 806299, leave a message, and a volunteer will reply within 24 hours. Please note that we're not part of social services, or an emergency service, we're just good neighbours! Finally, a big shot of gratitude to our volunteers, both past and present – none of this would be possible without all those generous people in our local community who selflessly give their time and effort to supporting their neighbours.

Isle of Wedmore Society

Our first meeting of 2026 and AGM attracted a wide audience of 35 members and 3 visitors, all keen to listen to our local resident and member, Paul Roberts, tell us everything we needed to know about the historic finger posts we see, but take little notice of, around the Parish.



As a newcomer to Wedmore, Paul had not taken a great interest in local signposts and, like so many of us, didn't know that they are known as 'finger posts' in Somerset, possibly because of their finger shaped ends. Paul got talking to a new friend, who casually said that the post they were looking at was one of the oldest in the county. Well, that did it and down the rabbit hole of curiosity he went and, just like Alice, he invited us to follow him. He began with the history of signposts. Way back in 1697 a law was passed requiring local communities to put up signs to major towns in their area, and successive laws have continued that need until 1933 when all signs were standardised. Then in 1940 the signs were taken down in case Hitler's troops invaded and wanted to know the way! However, the only foreigners to be inconvenienced were those of America and Canada here to help us win that war.

After the war Somerset was one of the first to renew their signs, only to be told in 1964 that the design had changed so they were encouraged to do theirs again. They refused, and so our iconic Finger Posts remain. There are very few modern signs to the national pattern in the county, as it was agreed that our historic signs could be retained due to their historical significance. In 2019 it was obvious that they needed attention, so a refurbishment scheme was undertaken.

Paul, as an engineer, went into great detail as to the making of the first posts, which are cast iron and were made in the local village of Mark, by two foundries producing identical items in direct competition. Their foundry marks can be found at the base of each post. The design is clever with a basic post, possibly nicely moulded, with a thinner high end onto which the individual fingers can be slotted and rotated as required but, not overtightened so that they would move rather than break if struck by a passing vehicle. The letters are capitals and the whole structure is usually painted in black and white. The finial carries the county initials.

Paul, on his walks and cycle rides, has catalogued our local posts and he put us to the test by challenging us to recognise his favourites. We need to try harder, and will certainly be better next time, as we will no longer take them for granted when we travel around the county.

After the talk we held our AGM, hearing that 2025 had been a successful year for the Society, with new members joining, and our finances in good shape. Our programme for 2026 was presented and well received and, although Ian Tomes and David Wood will no longer be on the committee, we were pleased to welcome Sally Heslop.

We now look forward to our next talk on the 26 March in the Masonic Hall at 7.30pm which, again, will be given by a local resident and Society member, Michael Blandford, who is going to tell us about The Waters of Wells.

Women of Wedmore – In the Footsteps of the Roman Legions



The challenges of torrential rain, a leaking tent, heavy rucksacks, and sore feet, failed to spoil a scenic walking holiday alongside an iconic Roman landmark. Women of Wedmore vice-president Marianne recalled her recent 80-mile Hadrian's Wall hike that she completed with her husband, Ian. The couple are no strangers to walking trips, having experienced The Inca Trail and a trek to Everest Base Camp in the past.

The Hadrian's Wall Path National Trail is a long-distance footpath running coast to coast from Wallsend in Tyne and Wear, to Bowness-on-Solway in Cumbria. It closely follows the route of the ancient Roman Wall which is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. It passes through beautiful countryside and the cities of Newcastle and Carlisle. The path can be followed east-to-west, in the direction the wall was originally built, or west-to-east, which keeps the wind at your back.

Marianne planned their six-day walk in the east-to-west direction and carefully organised their holiday using a detailed spreadsheet. However, there were challenges, as much of the accommodation on the trail was either fully booked or had, unfortunately, completely closed down. Having flown into Newcastle to start their walk, they were reliant on either their own two feet or buses, but they discovered that on some days there were no options for rural public transport.

The original idea to camp for three nights didn't quite turn out as expected due to the bad weather. They spent one night under canvas near a pig sty, with two large pigs for company. It rained all night and was still raining when they got up the following morning, so the tent was swiftly bundled into a rucksack and didn't come out again until they reached home! For the rest of the trip they stayed in bed and breakfast accommodation, a hostel, and an Airbnb on the route. Thanks to a tip from another walker, they discovered a reasonably priced baggage transfer service, and they handed their rucksacks over to the aptly named 'Hadrian's Haul' company for the rest of their holiday. But carrying up to 12kg had taken its toll on Marianne's feet and by the time day five arrived her feet were very painful. Thankfully, swapping her walking boots for her light training shoes helped, as did easier walking country.



The wall was built by Roman legions as a defence and border control under the orders of Emperor Hadrian in AD122. (On the middle section of the wall the bus service is named AD122!) Interestingly, until the mid-19th century it was known as the Wall of Severus, named after another Roman emperor, who repaired the wall at a later date. Over time, stones from the wall were used to build local castles, churches, farms and houses. Conservationists put a stop to this, and in 1839 historian and clergyman John Hodgson published evidence that the wall was built by Hadrian. About 10 miles of the wall is still visible today. Features on the route include the remains of milecastles (small forts) and turrets. At the iconic Sycamore Gap, visitors can see the remaining stump of the illegally felled tree. Marianne recorded her walk on GPS, walking 80 miles of the trail took them 31 hours and 44 minutes. Marianne walked a total of 222,406 steps.

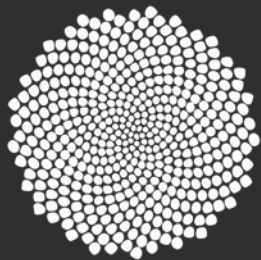

Our Christmas Party was held on the at the Wedmore Golf Club on 12 January. The evening started with the presentation of the following cups: Cheddar Championship Pairs cup - Jane Hall and Peter Dawes; Wedmore Championship Pairs cup - Paul St. Quintin and Geoff Davies; Cheddar Championship Teams cup - Mike Smith, Chris Bryant, Michael O'Brien and Ray Harper; Wedmore Handicap Teams cup - Jean Lowe, Rachael Brown, Sue Gudgeon and Malcolm Scard and the Cheddar Handicap Teams cup - Bob Williams, Marilyn Dykes, Sue Gudgeon and Bob Jepps. After a substantial buffet we finished by playing a duplicate Chicago session which was won NS by Paul St. Quintin and Geoff Davies and EW by Barbara Biggins and Gillian Toogood. It was an extremely enjoyable evening, and we thank all involved in organising it.

Bridge is all about you and your partner describing your hand to each other to get to the best contract. Unfortunately, the opponents also get to hear your conversation, and this may help them foil your plans. This month's hand is an example of listening to the opponents' bidding to work out how best to defend. The East/West pairs usually bid: 1NT (weak) – 2C (Stayman) – 2D (no 4-card major) – 2NT – pass. South is then faced with an unenviable choice of lead.

'4th highest, longest and strongest' is an oft quoted maxim but playing pairs, where every trick matters, leading from an unsupported honour as you would have to do here frequently gives a trick away. I therefore chose the 7 of spades 'top of nothing' lead. The Jack was played and North faced a key decision. Should they go up with the King? It seems obvious to take the King and return a spade to clear the Ace but North has no sure entry for their long spades. From the bidding, East has two or three spades. If he has two then South has four and the 7 can't be top of nothing since North can see that there are only two cards below it that they could have. It could be fourth highest from QT97, but South would have led the ten from this holding so South and East have three spades each.

The bidding shows that East has 12 to 13 points and West has about 11 so North can work out that South has 11 or 12 points and could easily have two or more entries. North should therefore not play their king of spades but keep it as an entry. Play

the 8 of spades instead, to encourage partner to continue. Knowing that East has, at most, 3 spades, South knows that North has 5 or more. They therefore clear the ace of spades after their first entry and after their second entry they put partner in with the king of spades to take two more tricks. Ultimately, on this hand, 2NT goes two off - as long as North does not play their king of spades on the first round!

Prickles Hedgehog Rescue in Cheddar

Prickles Hedgehog Rescue is a charitable organisation based in Cheddar, which has recently avoided closure owing to the generous support of the public. Established in 2007, the charity is managed by four Trustees, a small, dedicated team of staff, and a group of committed volunteers. Prickles takes pride in its record of caring for and releasing over 500 hedgehogs each year. The rescue centre has helped more than 7,000 hedgehogs.

Hedgehogs are in urgent need of our help. Their population has plummeted from an estimated 30 million in the 1970s to just 1 million today. This dramatic decline is largely due to the loss of their natural habitats, increased use of pesticides that destroy many of their food sources, and a rise in vehicle traffic. Hedgehogs, being naturally inquisitive, often find themselves in difficult situations that can result in injury, becoming orphaned, or falling ill.

At Prickles, we focus on rescuing hedgehogs, providing rehabilitation through care and treatment, and then releasing them back into the wild. You can help hedgehogs by placing bowls of fresh water in your garden to provide drinking sources for hedgehogs; scattering poultry-flavoured cat biscuits around your garden, or set up a feeding station using a plastic container with a small entrance cut out; positioning a hedgehog box filled with hay in a quiet corner of your garden, ideally beneath a shrub, to offer shelter; if you have a pond, install a ramp to allow hedgehogs an easy escape route; and ensuring that hedgehogs can move freely between gardens by leaving small gaps in fences.

If you spot a hedgehog out during the day this may indicate illness, so please contact Prickles by phone on 07806 744772. The centre is open every day from 9.00am to 17.00pm.

Royal Air Forces Association Mid-Somerset Branch

The February Branch meeting featured a presentation by our Branch President Dick Whittingham entitled 'A Belgian Spitfire Pilot WW2 and after', that followed on from his January presentation on the early WW2 career of Bobby Laumans. This presentation took us from 1 June 1942, when Bobby's Spitfire was hit by fire from two German Focke-Wulf 190s and he bailed out over the English Channel. Unfortunately, he was rescued by the German Navy and by 11 June he was a PoW in Stalag Luft III, Poland, made famous by films the 'The Wooden Horse' and 'The Great Escape'.

Bobby remained a PoW for 3 years and was a major force in the production of the Camp Shows designing and producing the sets costumes, while acting as one of the 'female' leads. In early 1945, the PoWs were moved back to Germany as part of the '100km Winter March', before being released by the British Forces in April 1945. Bobby returned to UK and during the summer and autumn of 1945 took part in several PoW review shows in London's West End along with 'Maigret' Rupert Davies. Bobby was discharged from the RAF and went home to Belgium, where he returned to flying with the Belgian airline Sabena, until he retired as a senior Boeing 747 Captain. He became a member of the RAFA Brussels Branch.

RNLI Mendip Branch

The Branch Annual Super Quiz on 31 January in Shipham Village Hall was a 'Sell-Out' with 20 teams comprising 120 enthusiastic Quizzers who enjoyed 14 rounds of six questions plus a picture round. On 11 January, Volunteers at RNLI Newcastle Lifeboat Station in Northern Ireland waved farewell to the last operational Mersey class lifeboat in the RNLI's fleet. Mersey Class Lifeboat 'Leonard Kent' fleet number '12-20' launched at 12.20pm precisely down the slipway and off to sea for the last time escorted by the Newcastle inshore lifeboats. The Mersey was introduced into the RNLI fleet in 1988. Following

a tradition of naming classes of lifeboats after rivers, this class was named after the River Mersey, which stretches for 70 miles from Stockport to Liverpool Bay. With a top speed of 17 knots, it was the last all-weather lifeboat not to have a 25-knot capability. During their lifespan, Mersey class lifeboats have been located at 52 stations across Ireland and the UK, including Newcastle, Clogherhead, Wicklow, Kilmore Quay and Clifden on the island of Ireland. In all, the Mersey launched over 11,800 times, with its volunteer crews coming to the aid of 13,784 people, saving 1,254 lives.

January Shouts

In January, there were 8 'shouts' between three of our four Somerset Lifeboat Stations (Minehead – 2, Portishead – 2, Weston-super-Mare – 4).

Portishead crew received their first call of 2026 at 6.37am on 20 January as many were woken up or on their way to work when the pager sounded. A vessel was reported to be taking on water at the mouth of the River Avon. The crew made best speed as there were two people on board needing urgent help.

On arrival at the scene it was only possible to see the wheelhouse of the stricken vessel as it was the only part of the boat that was above the water. The two crew on board had made the quick decision to run the vessel up on to the bank to prevent it completely submerging and awaited rescue. With a lot of experience on that stretch of water, the crew knew exactly what to do and were well equipped. The crew were then able to go alongside and take the casualties on to the RNLI Atlantic 85 lifeboat and drop them onto another vessel which was making way to come and help their colleagues that were in trouble. It was a great ending to a quickly moving shout.

Easter egg hunts for the children follow these: 9.15am at Allerton Church, Holy Cross Mark and Holy Trinity Blackford; and 10.45am at St Mary's Wedmore and Christ Church, Theale.

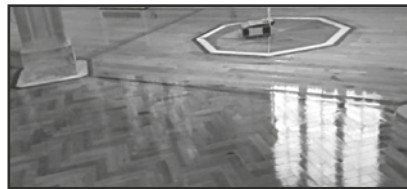

Wedmore Community Bus



The Community Bus is a not-for-profit bus service run by volunteers for the benefit of the local community. It currently provides regular weekly scheduled services to four locations and monthly services to Bath, Cribbs Causeway and Wells. The bus is also available for private hire, principally for the use of local community groups.

The bus is a friendly place and open to everyone. Our drivers want to help you enjoy your time on the bus as much as possible. Except for the Bath service, whenever possible we try to pick-up and drop-off at a location that is convenient to you, including your home if you need this. We are also flexible about drop-offs en-route. We are happy to provide help in getting on and off the bus for those who need it.

Fares are kept low, as the bus is financed by Somerset Council and all our drivers are volunteers. The service is free for everyone with a concessionary Bus Pass, except for the Bath and Cribbs Causeway services which are £2 for concessions. All services are free for children under 5 years old.
